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NESCA Trade Show Coming October 10th

Governor Signs New Payroll Reporting Requirements

On September 4, 2024, Governor Hochul signed legislation (Chapter 304 Laws of 2024) that will soon impose new payroll reporting requirements on contractors and subcontractors performing public work as well as for work on certain private "covered projects".

This new law will require contractors and subcontractors to submit, on a monthly basis, certified payroll records directly to the NYS Department of Labor in an electronic format to be prescribed by the Department of Labor. The law will also require contractors and subcontractors to provide documentation of each fund, plan or program where any supplement has been paid or provided for, and to provide a copy of the payment bond required by Section 137 of the State Finance Law. Further, the law requires the Labor Department to develop and implement, by December 31, 2024, an on-line database of certified payroll records submitted by contractors and subcontractors. This database will be publicly accessible but will not include personally identifiable information.

Failure by a contractor or subcontractor to furnish the required payroll records to the Labor Department will result in a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day the contractor or subcontractor is in violation.

As a reminder to NESCA members, a private "covered project" is a private project costing more than \$5 million where the amount of public involvement (through grants, tax abatements, etc.) is at least 30% of the total construction project costs.

The bill sponsors in the Senate and Assembly maintained that this legislation "will provide a more streamlined system for DOL to collect and maintain certified payroll already required by the law" and "will also assist the various public entities, including municipalities, who are responsible for ensuring contractors maintain these records". The bill sponsors also argued that since public work contractors will have to register with the Department of Labor at the end of 2024, it makes sense for the payroll reporting to be included.

This new law took effect on September 4th, but won't be implemented until DOL develops the on-line database.

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COUNSEL'S MESSAGE

The membership is aware that many of these legal columns address issues that necessarily flow from the language used and scope of work within the subcontract with either the General Contractor, Construction Manager or in some instances the project Owner.

The reason for this focus is that most legal disputes flow out of the terms and conditions of the subcontract and the ramifications flowing from the Prime Contract documents through the incorporation by reference clauses. It is hoped that by providing information, the membership can avoid future difficulties by addressing the source at the contract formation stage.

A frequent source of dispute our office is asked to address is what exactly is the scope of work to be performed under the subcontract. It sounds like a simple solution, but it is not.

Many subcontractors attempt to use the proposal or quotation submitted for their work as a scope description. The difficulty with that is the proposal description may require clarification or has not definitively excluded a scope of work.

The subcontractor's proposal will serve as the base scope of work which subcontractor agreed to perform and should always reference the precise specification section and drawing details involved.

However, if in addition to the subcontractor's proposal, the contractor inserts in the boiler plate of the subcontract additional language such as "subcontractor shall provide all things necessary to perform and complete the scope of work in the contract documents" a dispute may be on the horizon.

The question presented is what is involved and included in the words "all things necessary to complete the work." Where is the described scope? What is meant by "all equipment, material and amount of labor necessary or as required to complete the work"?

In these instance's the precise description of the work to be performed, the precise light fixtures or plumbing fixtures to be supplied, the party responsible for preparatory or finish work needs to be listed. If there is a supply only without installation that should also be stated as excluded.

As always, the membership should be familiar and comfortable with the contractor they are working with on the subcontract. The terms and conditions and work scope should not be something to gloss over under the belief "they are all the same" or "I can't modify anything anyway."

Members are also responsible to themselves to avoid subcontract problems. Read and understand everything! Specify, or exclude, the precise scope of your subcontract responsibilities. Read the prime contract terms and conditions as well as the subcontract terms and conditions in conjunction with the specifications.

This investment of time will return the benefit of reducing the potential for disputes on the project!
